Nassau County Opioid Treatment Program Mission Statement

The Mission of NC Opioid Treatment Program is to treat individuals suffering from an Opiate Substance Use Disorder with a comprehensive, culturally competent bio-psycho-social approach to assist the chemically dependent persons to cease the use of illicit and/or controlled substances and move towards leading a healthy and productive life.

The goal of this program is to utilize intensive, inter-disciplinary services and individualized treatment planning to successfully intervene with the chemically dependent client.

Objectives include but are not limited to:

- Medical intervention with physically compromised Hepatitis C and HIV population,
- Psychiatric stabilization of those clients with dual diagnoses
- To provide medical assisted treatment and assign clients to appropriate treatment track to achieve optimal client focused outcomes
- Supply addiction specific recovery counseling.

Methadone Maintenance

Methadone is a long-acting opioid full agonist (opioid blocker) that is prescribed as a treatment for opioid substance use disorder which addresses **only** the treatment of opiates. Methadone is given daily at a therapeutic dose and when patient is stabilized, Methadone will:

- * suppress opioid withdrawal symptoms
- * reduce cravings for opioids
- not induce intoxication (e.g.: sedation or euphoria)
- reduce the euphoric effects of other opioids, such as heroin.
- Give the individual a chance to work on their life issues with the clinical staff

Suboxone

Suboxone is used for the treatment of opioid substance use disorder and is a partial agonist medication-assisted treatment. Suboxone is given in the form of a sublingual film which contains the active ingredients buprenorphine and naloxone.

Extended Release Naltrexone

This form of Opioid Substance Use Disorder treatment is a complete opioid blocker antagonist which consists of an extended-release injectable suspension of naltrexone that is administered once a month by a healthcare professional. This form of medication assistance, when given, attaches to certain opioid receptors in the brain and blocks the pleasurable feelings associated with taking opioids. It can

- prevent relapse to opioid dependence after detox
- treat alcohol dependence. (One should have complete abstinence from alcohol before starting this treatment)
- must be opioid-free for a minimum of 7-14 days to avoid sudden opioid withdrawal

Long Acting Naltrexone for Extended Release is not a narcotic, not pleasure producing, not addictive, and no withdrawal

Medical Maintenance

This track is for individuals who have been maintained on an Opioid medication assisted treatment for a long period of time and have repaired their lifestyle. These individual do not want to taper off of the maintenance medication and are in need of medical supervision only.
